Keeping it Organized

Abstract - Recap

- MLA Format w/header.
- No more than 1 full page, and no less than $\frac{3}{4}$ of a page.
- Informal writing (personal pronouns are permitted).
- Abstract should explicitly explain the claim that you are making, and where you intend to “go” with your research.
- Once you have produced your abstract, turn it in via link on my website.

Remember

The key to success will be the
“thing” you are trying to
argue/prove.

It's okay if this evolves over the course of your research.
In fact, it should evolve. It's a living and breathing
concept, meant to be nurtured and grow up.

Sources & Data Management

- Use OneDrive/Google Drive to keep a document with all of your citations.
 - They don't necessarily have to be in proper format yet, but somewhere where you can keep all of your sources in one place.
- SAVE copies of all of your source material. (As shown on Thursday in class w/ Mr. Haake).
 - Even if you are unsure if you will use information from the source, sometimes you might find something that is interesting and you may want to refer to later on - save it!
- Keep track of your business.

Notecards

As you are researching - always remember what it is you are trying to argue/prove. Your sources and information should always support your argument.

- Use ONE notecard per piece of information you plan to incorporate into your paper.
 - On one side of the notecard - write/paraphrase the information you will use.
 - On the other side - write a reference to the source that it was pulled from. Make a note on this side where you may intend to include this information to support your argument/point.
- Tip: On each card - create a code system to keep your information organized.

Notecards

- Why use notecards?
 - Helps you to consolidate your information.
 - Helps you to keep track of your facts/data in a visual way.
 - As you are planning your paper - in the next stages - they are easily manipulated and moved around to better organize your writing.
 - Helps you to visualize weaknesses in your arguments.
 - Color code to organize/group facts and data.

Next Steps

1. Finalize your topic - have a brief conversation with me about the direction you are taking.
2. Compile your general notes/ideas for your abstract. Start to think about sources.
3. Compose and turn in your abstract. - **Realistically this should be done by Tuesday/Wednesday.**
4. Start really defining/focusing your argument.
5. Setup and organize your source and data management.
6. Start the research process with sources & notecards.
7. Keep track of all of the sources you pull information from in one, central location.
